### What is the IATC?

The IATC is an organisation registered in Hong Kong. The aims of the organisation are to:

- (a) promote the rule of law;
- (b) promote high standards of advocacy internationally;
- (c) promote best-practice in advocacy training internationally;
- (d) promote the independence and integrity of advocates internationally; and
- (e) promote good administration of justice;

by promoting and supporting professional advocacy training by practicing advocates and judges on a pro bono basis throughout the common law world and beyond; and supporting and co-ordinating the provision of international advocacy training by affiliated bar associations or councils around the world. The IATC provides teacher training on a non-profit making basis to bar associations or councils around the world, to assist in the establishing of an independent local advocacy training programme to the highest international standards. It can also provide assistance in designing and initial administrative support for advocacy training programmes; and provide international teachers to teach on such courses.

INTERNATIONAL ADVOCACY TRAINING COUNCIL (IATC)

Advocacy training is undertaken by many organisations and Bar Associations throughout the world. The development of advocacy training is crucial to ensure the highest standards of advocacy and to promote the rule of law. The IATC is an international organisation set up for this purpose and to promote best-practices in advocacy training internationally.

"Advocacy in Asia" is an international conference organized by the IATC to showcase advocacy training as a means of promoting the development of the rule of law and the highest standards of advocacy throughout the region.

Through a combination of lectures and discussion groups, the Conference aims to cover areas such as advocacy training methods and teacher training as well as other core aspects of advocacy training, including expert evidence, appellate advocacy and inter-organisation co-operation in support of international advocacy training. The Conference will feature sessions delivered by senior Judges and Barristers from the major advocacy training jurisdictions.

This is a unique opportunity to meet, promote and share ideas with other advocacy trainers across the globe. We hope to develop a strong and vibrant international community of advocacy trainers who all share the same strong commitment towards the teaching of advocacy and the promotion of the rule of law.

The Conference promises to bring together advocacy trainers (barristers, advocates and judges) from all the major common law jurisdictions including England and Wales, Australia, South Africa, Hong Kong, Singapore, New Zealand, Zimbabwe and the host nation Malaysia. 

# CONFIRMED SPEAKERS

## The Rt. Hon. The Lord Robert Walker of Gestingthorpe



Lord Walker is a retired Justice of the Supreme Court of the United Kingdom. Lord Walker was made Lord of Appeal in Ordinary in October 2002 and on 1 October 2009 he was invested as a Justice of the Supreme Court alongside nine other Lords of Appeal in Ordinary. After his retirement in 2013, Lord Walker continues to serve as a Non-Permanent Judge of the Hong Kong Court of Final Appeal. He is one of the Patrons of the IATC.

## The Hon. Chief Justice Geoffrey Ma, G.B.M.



Mr. Justice Ma is the Chief Justice of the Hong Kong Court of Final Appeal. He was called to the Hong Kong Bar in 1980 and was appointed Queen's Counsel in 1993. He joined the Judiciary as a Judge of the Court of First Instance in 2001; and was then appointed as Justice of Appeal of the Court of Appeal in 2002, Chief Judge of the High Court in 2003, and finally as Chief Justice in 2010. He was made an Honorary Bencher of Gray's Inn in 2004 and is a Patron of the IATC.

## The Hon. Justice Susan Kiefel A.C.



Justice Kiefel was appointed to the High Court of Australia in September 2007. At the time of her appointment she was a judge of the Federal Court of Australia. Justice Kiefel is also one of the Patrons of the IATC.

## Justice Shiranee Tilakawardane



Justice Tilakawardane has just retired as Acting Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Sri Lanka, having been its only female member and the first female President of the Court of Appeal and Admiralty Judge. She is Consultant to the Judicial Training Institute and has conducted judicial training in

human rights and equality in Nepal, India, Pakistan and Bangladesh and has doctorates for international work on women and children's rights in Smith College and William's College USA; and in forensic medicine and in human rights; and an award in recognition of her work for "Women and Peace" from the JF Kennedy School of Government; and diplomas in International Commercial Law and Banking.

## YA Dato' Mary Lim



Justice Mary Lim read law at the University of Leeds, UK and graduated with LLB (Hons). She was admitted to Lincoln's Inn as a Barrister at law. She also obtained an LLM in law at the University of Western Australia. Justice Lim is currently sitting in the High Court of Malaya, Kuala Lumpur.

## Judge Sharise Weiner



Judge Sharise Weiner is a Judge of the High Court of South Africa. Judge Weiner was intimately involved from the outset in the training of advocates, taking part in the first advocacy training workshop in 1996 under the guidance of trainers from Gray's Inn and has been integrally involved in advocacy training in South Africa ever since.

## The Hon. Justice Glenn Martin A.M.



Justice Glenn Martin is the Vice-Chairman of the International Advocacy Training Council. Justice Martin was appointed a Judge of the Supreme Court of Queensland in 2007. He was the Inaugural Chair of the Australian Bar Advocacy Training Council. Justice Martin served as vice-president (2005–06) and president (2006–07) of the Australian Bar Association and was appointed a life member of the Australian Bar Association in 2007.

### **Tino Bere**



Tino's area of specialisation is Corporate Law with emphasis on institutional set up and advancement, commercial and property practice. Tino is passionate about human rights advocacy and training as well as legal profession governance and continuing legal training. He has also become a regular resource

person and presenter at many international legal conferences organised by among others, Commonwealth Lawyers Association, World Bar Council, International Bar Association, SADC Lawyers Association, Zimbabwe Lawyers for Human Rights and Law Society of Zimbabwe.

He was the first Chairman of the England and Wales Bar Council ADR Committee, a member of the working party which drafted the EU Code of Practice for Mediators, and gave expert opinion to JURI, the legal service committee of the European Parliament, prior to its adopting the European ADR Directive. In 2012 he was invited to join the Singapore Mediation Centre's International Panel of Mediators. Michel is a founder member of Independent Mediators Ltd.

Mark Mulholland was called to the Bar of Northern Ireland in 1993 and commenced practice in 1994. Mark was appointed as Queens Counsel, in 2011. 


